Whatever path you choose, it is important to start planning now so that you are better prepared for the future.

We want you to have a high school program that complements and prepares you for your future aspirations. Regardless of the destination, we are here to work with you and ensure you are prepared for success.

Exploring Your Interests

Your opportunities for success are endless. The labour market is facing an aging workforce, rapid technological changes, demands for new skills and a shortage of qualified employees. These are all good reasons to start thinking about your post-secondary future.



WHAT YOU NEED TO GRADUATE

COMPULSORY CREDITS

credits in English (1 credit per grade)

credit in French as a Second Language

credits in mathematics (at least 1 credit in Grade 11 or 12)

credits in science

credit in Canadian history

credit in Canadian geography

credit in the arts

credit in health and physical education

credit in civics

credit in career studies

All secondary school programs in the province of Ontario are based on a credit system. You must earn a total of 30 credits in order to receive a high school diploma (also known as the Ontario Secondary School Diploma - OSSD). One credit is equal to a 110 hour course that you must successfully complete.

+ 1 FROM EACH GROUP

GROUP 1:

1 additional credit in English, or French as a Second Language or a Native language, or a classical or international language, or a social science and the humanities, or Canadian and world studies, or guidance and career education, or cooperative education

GROUP 2:

1 additional credit in health and physical education, or the arts, or business studies, or French as a Second Language, or cooperative education

GROUP 3:

1 additional credit in science, or technological education, or French as a Second Language, or computer studies, or cooperative education

+8 OPTIONAL CREDITS

Build an educational program that suits your individual interests and meets university, college, apprenticeship or work requirements by carefully choosing optional or elective credits.

+ 4 RELIGION CREDITS

As a member of a Catholic school community, you will also take four religion courses, one each year of high school.





+ 40 Hours of Community Involvement Activities

You must complete a minimum of 40 hours of unpaid community involvement activities at any time throughout your secondary program. Students can begin collecting these hours the summer before Grade 9.

You must complete this requirement on your own time, outside of normal classroom hours. All students must maintain and provide a record of their community involvement activities using the school forms that are provided. Your principal will decide whether you have met the requirements for both the Ministry of Education and the Board for these activities.

+ Ontario Secondary School Literacy Test (OSSLT)

Students in Ontario are required by the provincial government to take the Ontario Secondary School Literacy Test (OSSLT) in Grade 10 and must pass the test to receive their OSSD. Students who do not complete the test successfully will receive additional help to prepare them for re-testing the following school year. Students who have been eligible to write the OSSLT at least twice, and have been unsuccessful at least once, may fulfill this requirement through the Ontario Secondary School Literacy Course (OLC4O). This course may also count as the Grade 12 English compulsory credit.

Students who do not pass the OSSLT have options - please refer to provincial testing on www.smcdsb.on.ca. Our website also provides information about OSSLT accommodations, special provisions, deferrals and exemptions.

CERTIFICATE OF EDUCATION/CERTIFICATE OF ACCOMPLISHMENT

If you do leave high school without achieving all of your necessary credits, we could grant you an Ontario Secondary School Certificate (often called a Certificate of Education). To receive a Certificate of Education, you will need 14 credits including: 7 compulsory credits & 7 elective credits.

The 7 compulsory credits include:

- 2 credits in English
- 1 credit in Canadian geography or Canadian history
- 1 credit in mathematics
- 1 credit in science
- 1 credit in health and physical education
- 1 credit in the arts or technological education

Students who leave school before fulfilling the requirements for the OSSD or the Certificate of Education may be granted a Certificate of Accomplishment.

Both the Certificate of Education and the Certificate of Accomplishment recognize achievements and can be used for students who plan to take certain vocational programs, training or who plan to find employment after leaving school.



TYPES OF COURSES

Is an **applied course** which focuses on the essential learning concepts of the subject. You will develop knowledge and skill through both theory and practical applications, but the focus will be on practical applications. Familiar, real-life situations will be used to illustrate ideas and opportunities will be given to students to experience hands-on applications of the concepts studied.

Is an **academic course** which focuses on the essential learning concepts of the subject, plus additional related concepts. Although students will develop knowledge and skills in the subject through both theory and practical applications, the emphasis will be on theory and abstract thinking as a basis for future learning and problem solving.

Open courses are appropriate for all students and may be taken to meet compulsory or optional requirements for graduation, or personal interest.

Is a **locally developed course** (this means the school board develops the course content and it has been approved by the Ministry of Education). We may offer courses in English, mathematics, history and science for students who may not be suited to applied or academic courses and require additional background knowledge and skills. These courses may be counted as compulsory credits and are only available in Grades 9 and 10. Speak to your guidance counsellor for more information.

These courses will give you the knowledge and skills needed to meet the entrance requirements for **university** programs. Teaching and learning will emphasize theoretical aspects of the course content, but will also include concrete applications.





These courses are designed to give you the knowledge and skills needed to meet the entrance requirements of specific **university** and college programs. Teaching and learning will emphasize both theoretical aspects and related concrete applications of the course content.

These courses will provide you with the knowledge and skills needed to meet the entrance requirements for **college** programs. Teaching and learning will emphasize concrete applications of the theoretical material covered in the course, and will also emphasize the development of critical-thinking and problem-solving skills.

These courses are designed to give you the knowledge and skills needed for you to directly enter the **workplace and other training programs** offered in the community. Teaching and learning will emphasize workplace applications of the course content, but will also explore the theoretical material that underlies these practical applications.

THE COURSE CODING SYSTEM

Every high school course is identified with a five-character code, for example ENG1D. Depending on what you plan to do after graduation, you will need to choose different types of courses.

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The first three characters of course codes are issued by the Ministry of Education and relate to the subject and course being identified

The fourth character indicates the grade level, in this case 1 refers to Grade 9, i.e., offered in year one or Grade 9

The fifth character refers to the type of course, in this case D is the course code for academic

P - applied

D - academic

O - open courses



E - workplace preparation





Note: If your child has special education needs and currently has modified and/or alternative programming, courses should be selected with the support of the school team. Please schedule a transition meeting with the secondary school-based team.

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Chaplaincy

Students who received resource assistance while in elementary school may be able to continue that in high school. Our resource team is trained to provide many opportunities to enhance your learning environment.

Student Success Teacher & Team

The student success teacher & the student success team provide support for students who may need additional assistance to ensure personal & academic success.

Community Resources

Our schools work closely with local parishes, law authorities, fire departments, libraries & community family support programs to ensure that each student is safe & cared for throughout their educational experience with the Simcoe Muskoka Catholic District School Board. If any person in your family requires support, contact your school for more information.

Student Evaluation

Ontario Student Record (OSR)


The OSR documents the educational progress of a student enrolled in school. In fact, the OSR is required for any student attending a school in the province of Ontario.

Ontario Student Transcript (OST)

The OST is an official document maintained by Ontario schools for each student. The OST is kept in the student's OSR & retained for 55 years after a student leaves school. It is a record of all high school coursework & diploma requirements & is typically required when applying to post-secondary education.

Withdrawal from a Course in Grade II or 12

Students in Grade 11 & 12 can withdraw from a course 5 days after mid-term reports are distributed without it appearing on their transcript. Withdrawing from a course after that date means that the mid-term mark will appear on the student transcript.

Successful Transitions for All

To support successful transitions into secondary school.

To have ongoing communication between home, school, parish and community partners.

To establish and review strategies and supports that are effective and beneficial for students transitioning into secondary school

Transition planning is about working together to understand and respond to your child's strengths, needs and interests. We look forward to meeting with you and your child. Your school team is here to work with you to ensure that your child has a positive, faith-filled experience in our Catholic schools.



Discussion items for a specialized transition meeting. This is where we talk about your child's strengths, needs and interests.



Make a request for a transition plan meeting. This includes staff from the elementary and secondary schools.

A good plan is key to positive transitioning into secondary school.

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Student Success Initiatives

Student Success is about improving student achievement and increasing program options and flexibility so that all students can be successful in high school. Students have unique interests, goals and strengths and should be given every opportunity to succeed.



Prior Learning Assessment and Recognition (PLAR)

If you have acquired knowledge and skills outside of an Ontario classroom (both formally or informally), you can have your skills and knowledge evaluated against curriculum expectations in order to earn credits toward your OSSD. If you have knowledge or skills that you would like to use to achieve credits, you will have to undergo a formal evaluation and accreditation called Prior Learning Assessment and Recognition (PLAR). For more information, speak to your guidance counsellor.

Specialist High Skills Major (SHSM)

SHSM is a program where students can get high school credits, work experience, certifications, and insights into a specific industry that they are interested in. The SHSM program enables senior students to gain valuable hands-on experience, while they are working toward their OSSD.

The purpose of this program is to help prepare students for life after high school. It allows students to direct their studies to a specific area of interest and prepares them for pursuing that interest either in the workplace, an apprenticeship, college or university.

Dual Credits

Dual credit is a course where you receive a college and high school credit at the same time - courses are taught by college faculty and supported by a high school teacher. Students who pass a dual credit course are given an optional credit at secondary school and are issued a college transcript. The course will be recognized at college if students choose to attend a program for which the course is

a requirement. Dual credits give students the opportunity to sample post-secondary education, work in college labs, experience a new environment and build confidence.

Cooperative Education

Co-op education is a program that integrates academic study with practical workplace experience. A co-op credit provides students with an excellent opportunity to test drive a job to see if it is suitable.

Students can also apply two co-op credits toward compulsory graduation requirements. Typical co-op programs have students working two to four periods a day, plus in-school sessions and workshops.

Continuing and Community Education

Our board offers a wide range of continuing education courses for both elementary (Grades 7 and 8) and secondary students. Students can take courses in the summer to catch up or jump start their studies. Elementary students can even earn a high school credit before getting there.

Credit Recovery

When a student is not successful in a course, credit recovery may be an option. If deemed appropriate by the school team, a student will work under the supervision of a teacher to meet the missed expectations. After evaluation, and if the missed expectations are met, the student will receive a credit for the course.

I CAN - Math Learning Strategies (GLS10)

I CAN (Improving Confidence and Achievement in Numeracy) is a program aimed at students who may be coming to high school with gaps in their math understandings, which can result in low confidence and a negative attitude toward mathematics.

Throughout the first semester as part of a Learning Strategies course, teachers will have the opportunity to build relationships with students, address knowledge gaps and build confidence toward mathematics. This credit bearing intervention will help students be more prepared to take on the MFM1P (Grade 9 applied math) course in second semester.

e-Learning

The Simcoe Muskoka Catholic Virtual Learning Centre (SMCVLC) offers online courses to students that may not be available at their high school.

Students who take courses through SMCVLC are provided with space in their timetable, a computer with Internet access, and daily support from their online teacher to help them successfully complete the course.

Ontario Youth Apprenticeship Program (OYAP)

Co-op students can learn a skilled trade while completing a high school diploma with the Ontario Youth Apprenticeship Program (OYAP). A co-op student may be signed as an apprentice with an employer at the time of his/her placement. Students graduate with a diploma, skills in a trade, experience in the workplace, and a head start in a skilled profession.
